

Retired educator makes splash with book

Bob Erickson's "Minnesota Splash" written from experience, love of sport

any years of experience as a swim coach and educator at Park gave Bob Erickson his inspiration to write "Minnesota Splash," describing Minnesota high school swimming and diving and its changes over the years.

Erickson said he was inspired to write the book to educate people about swimming.

"It hadn't been done and as far as I can tell, no state has ever written a history of high school swimming for girls and boys," Erickson said.

Erickson started working at Park in 1959 and worked there for 34 years, creating the strong connection to the school district which he still feels today. He said he supports St. Louis Park public schools for many reasons.

"I support St. Louis Park public schools because of what they have done for so many people and for what they stand for in terms of education, integrity and supporting the teachers and students," Erickson said. "Through my teaching, I found that parents together with the administration were extremely supportive of everything we did in school and in this day and age, that's a tough thing to find."

Erickson said he made life-long friendships with students and staff at Park.

"I thoroughly enjoyed the staff," Erickson said. "Every Wednesday we get together (for a retired staff breakfast), which is a rarity among educators."

Erickson spoke about the upcoming event next week to celebrate his book and Park swimming alumni.

"A number of swimmers and divers told

me that they're going to come and they want to hear stories I have to tell," Erickson said. "They want to know more about swimming in Minnesota that they don't know. It's going to be a very enjoyable and fun evening."

To learn more about Minnesota high school swimming and meet with fans of the sport, come hear Erickson discuss his book at 7 p.m. Nov. 5 in C350 at the high school. An admission fee of \$10 is encouraged, and all proceeds to go to support the SLPPSF.



3D printing technology turns concepts into reality

Grant-purchased equipment brings students' ideas to life

The new 3D printer at the high school purchased by a grant from the St. Louis Park Public Schools Foundation allows students to move past the conceptual stage and create physical prototypes of their ideas, according to engineering teacher Trevor Paulson.

"We're finally able to start getting stu-

dents to do things physically," Paulson said.

Paulson said the printer mainly gets used for his introductory engineering course. In an hour, students can make a low-resolution print of their concept to improve their design. He said he feels grateful to integrate technological advances into his classes.

"I'm always excited when we start getting up-to-date with current technology and current standards that allow students to gain more real world applications of their work," Paulson said. Senior Totaram Brijmohan said he has already gotten the opportunity to print one of his designs in engineering class.

"I've used it so far to design a remote holder in my engineering class," Brijmohan said.

Brijmohan said he's thrilled to have access to this advanced technology in high school.

"The fact that Park has one and that Mr. Paulson worked so hard to get it, it's a good feeling, one that I really don't know how to describe," Brijmohan said.
